

COVER SHOT | ART

E.J. Gold& JazzArt

For the past five years JazzArt has joined in association with the prestigious International Association for Jazz Education, providing colossal stage backdrops as well as reception area paintings, graphics and publication illustrations for the annual IAJE conferences...

n amazing fusion of art and music is happening. JazzArt, a growing collection of monumental and luxuriously gestural, musical themed paintings, is joining with jazz performances in a joyous

celebration of the spirit of jazz.

JazzArt came to the forefront with Wynton Marsalis in 2001 during three sold-out Northern California weekend events that left concertgoers enraptured not only with the music but also with the jazz inspired, art filled environment. Five extraordinary 10' x 6' JazzArt painted canvasses were displayed onstage with the performers, reflecting and radiating the essence of the music.

Fueled by that key encounter with Marsalis, JazzArt has continued to expand and evolve, generating a kind of magic

wherever it is displayed. It has since graced the performances of some of the greatest jazz musicians alive today including Dave Brubeck, Herbie Hancock, Chick Corea, Nancy Wilson, Oscar Peterson, Ravi Coltrane, Kenny Werner, Roberta Gambarini, Toots Theilmans, Nnenna Freelon and many others.

For the past five years JazzArt has joined in association with the prestigious International Association for Jazz Education, providing colossal stage backdrops as well as reception area paintings, graphics and publication illustrations for the annual IAJE conferences in Toronto, New York City and Long Beach, CA. The combination of this colorful and iconic monumental art with high level jazz music creates a visual/auditory fusion that is nothing short of transformational, turning previously

featureless venues into vibrant, visually alive spaces that bring out the best in both jazz performance and listener experience.

E.J. Gold is the creator of JazzArt. A native

New Yorker and an accomplished jazz musician himself, Gold began his artistic career while still a child, participating at the Museum of Modern Art's Children's Art Carnival. Later he frequented the famous Cedar Bar in the heyday of the New York School, taking in the excitement of interactions with major artists like Willem DeKooning, Elaine DeKooning, Mark Rothko, Larry Rivers, Jackson Pollock and Lee Krasner. Gold also became increasingly involved with the New York music scene, eventually owning and managing several popular New York jazz clubs. After moving to Los Angeles in the 1960s, Gold

studied and later taught at Otis Art Institute, where he took in the influences of Rico Lebrun, Bentley Schaad and Fritz Schwaderer. He then went on to become a prominent member of the infamous California Nine, a guerilla artist group of the 60s. More recently, Gold and a number of his students and artist friends founded the Grass Valley Graphics Group, together authoring the "Manifesto on Reductionism," a cutting edge experiment in minimizing visual elaboration to allow the viewer's expectations, previously experienced visual and emotional stimuli, and stored patterns to determine perception.

Pieces from Gold's prodigious body of work have been shown in established and alternative art galleries in a variety of countries including Norway, Canada, Spain, England, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, Brazil, Mexico, and Australia. A Gold portrait of Herbie

Hancock is part of the permanent collection at the Smithsonian Institution, and some Gold Odalisque ceramics, particularly appreciated for their vividness and boldness, have been displayed in the solarium of the White House.

Today, Gold's love of music is vitally alive in his paintings, and on any given day you might find him jamming on sax, piano, guitar, drums and flute in his own recording studio and at gigs with his jazz musician friends.



JazzArt® Dazzles the Audience at the Hollywood Bowl

Jazz legend Dianne Reeves opened the final show of the 2005 "Jazz at the Bowl" season, as evidenced by the rich, soulful vocal stylings, the quality of the music was way up there in the stratosphere.


But before George Duke & Friends made their appearance, the audience was treated to a special treat: *jazz for the eyes....*

The four giant high-def projection screens, to the sides of the Bowl's large stage and in the amphitheater, suddenly came to life with the bold, colorful art of American painter E.J. Gold. Consisting primarily of playful, strong gestural lines, the whimsical, impressionistic images of horns, saxes, drums, keyboards and the players that play them seemed somehow to capture the feel of jazz itself. Forms were suggested and offered up, but not insisted on. The audience, over ten thousand strong, definitely seemed to "get it".

JazzArt® sampling that danced across 4 screens




The main event featured George Duke & Friends, with Christian McBride on bass, Billy Cobham on drums, Airto, Kenny Garrett alto sax, Roy Hargrove trumpet and Bobby Hutcherson on vibes and marimba, is the proverbial Who's Who of giants from the jazz/fusion world.





More than 36 electronic images (digitally captured from original performance stage backdrop canvases) were shown simultaneously over the four screens. As one faded from the screen, it was replaced by another one even more playful and colorful than the last. The cumulative effect was a great visual jazz riff, and though there was no question that this was indeed something different for the Hollywood Bowl, joining jazz for the eyes with jazz for the ears was appreciated by thousands of jazz enthusiasts.


